

Survived, We Did

1944--Carl joins the partisans. Rose continues to move eastward to Rogiszht, Russia. Carl deserts the partisans to join Rose and the remaining family. They move back to Ludmir.

January 12, 1945--Rose and Carl marry. Although they are all living in Rose's childhood home deserted by Poles, Ludmir has greatly changed. Less than 10% of the 20,000 Ludmir Jews who were living in 1939 are still alive.

May, 1945--Rose and Carl move to Berlin, hidden in the walls of a truck. They were then relocated to a displaced persons camp, Schlachtensee.

1946--Daughter Eva is born in Schlachtensee. Chaya and the children move to Israel. However, Carl, Rose and Eva are unable to move with them due to restrictions of age and health.

1949--Rose, Eva and Carl, immigrate to America with assistance from HIAS (Hebrew Immigration Aid Society) on the *SS General Ballou* through Ellis Island. They settle in Jacksonville, Florida. Two more daughters, Anita and Susan are born in Florida. Carl supports his family as a produce manager and then as a service station owner.
